What is the PPG currently working on?


Puddletown Patient Participation Group decided to raise funds to buy something which would help patients. promote self-help. wellness and support patients to Know Your Numbers, in the words of the recent NHS promotion. The PPG have been selling raffle tickets during our Winter vaccination clinics to try and raise the money to buy a Blood Pressure machine for the waiting room.

The surgery and the PPG would like to thank everyone for their generous donations towards this project. The initial target was to reach £1600 and this has now been exceeded which means there should be enough left for maintenance annual and calibration. paying for consumables (paper roll) and for a stool that patients can sit on whilst their blood having pressure measured. The machine should be in the waiting room early in 2025 so keep your eyes peeled.

Why did you join the PPG?

AB: I had worked in a GP surgery setting for many years and understand how a general practice works. Puddletown Surgery gives so much to patients and I felt it was my turn to give back without adding extra work for staff here. The PPG is now making progress as a group and I feel we are making a difference with this project. We have had assistance from The Rotary Club who helped with calculating how many books of raffle tickets we would need to reach our target.

RB: Having been a patient here for many years and benefitted from excellent care, I received a text when the PPG was trying to recruit members and especially a new chairman. The practice has been good to me and like AB I wanted to give something back. Using my experience from my work life I gave a presentation along with four other PPG members at the meeting in September 2023. The rest of the group voted on who they wanted as chairperson and I have been in post since the 20th December 2023. This is usually a two-year term.



The PPG has achieved more in the last six months than previously, this is mainly due to communications effective keeping things moving by having regular meetings with the whole group and interim core group meetings with the secretary (AB), chair (RB) and vice chair (Anthony Felstead) and Clare Stickland, Practice Manager. RB commented that AB is vital to this as she keeps the momentum moving.

The PPG is a voice for patients and hope they empower patients to say something. Currently the group aims to keep the committee membership to twenty people but has a wider forum of volunteers which they would like to expand. The group also would like to have some younger representation, not necessarily to come to the meetings but to receive communications and feedback by email. 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Patient Wellbeing

Our Social Prescriber can help with a variety of health and wellbeing issues such as stress, bereavement, loneliness, housing or financial issues or maybe you are just feeling a lack of motivation and don't know who to turn to. Social prescribing can connect you to a wide range of resources social includina groups, community and voluntary services as well as practical support such as energy advice services or financial advice.

Our Social Prescribers have helped people find someone to walk their dog when they no longer could, connected people to chess, art and book groups. They have people helped connect condition specific support such as stroke services and dementia support, issued food bank vouchers and linked people with grants for surviving winter and so much more. Safe and Well visits

Dorset and Wiltshire Fire and rescue service offer a completely free safe and well visit to eligible individuals. It includes a room by room check to provide you with appropriate advice and support to keep your household safe from the risk of fire. The Safe and Well discussion will cover topics such as:

- Using electricity safely
- Cooking safely
- Making an escape plan
- What to do if there is a fire
- Keeping children safe
- Good practice night time routine and other points relevant to you
- Identifying and discussing any further support you may need if necessary

To see if you are eligible for a Safe and Well Visit, please visit www.dwfire.org.uk/safe-and-well-visits/ or alternatively, call 0800 038 2323 and speak to a member of the Prevention Administration Team. If you do not

qualify for a Safe and Well Visit, you will be sent safety information via email or letter.

Money Matters

Dorset Council estimate that 5000 people are missing out on money they are entitled to. Thousands of people who are over State Pension age are missing out on financial support that could mean they are £75 a week better off.

Pension Credit is extra financial help to assist with living costs if you are of State Pension age (66+) and on a low income. It can help with general housing costs and bills and give you extra support that you are entitled to.

It is separate from the state pension, which means that you could still be entitled to Pension Credit even if you have other income, savings or own your own home, if you fall within the criteria.

It is easy to check whether you are eligible by using the Pension Credit calculator online at www.gov.uk/pension-credit, call and book an appointment with Citizens Advice at the surgery.

Let it Snow!



The recent snow has highlighted the issues we face as a rural practice with some of the staff unable to get to work, especially as schools closed and roads became impassable.

If we get more snow and you want to rearrange your appointment then please phone the surgery, we are lucky in that we do have members of the reception team who live locally and should be able to make it into the surgery or staff may be answering the phones from home. Obviously we may need to rearrange appointments and restrict the opening times according to the levels of disruption. We will try and update our Facebook page and website as required.

Some people are more vulnerable to the effects of cold weather. These include:

- people aged 65 and older
- babies and children under the age of 5
- people on a low income (so cannot afford heating)
- people who have a long-term health condition
- people with a disability
- pregnant women
- people who have a mental health condition

If members of your family or neighbours are vulnerable when there is snow please check in on them to ensure they are safe and warm.
